The Illinois Community College Board (ICCB) coordinates the Underrepresented Groups Report with the Illinois Board of Higher Education (IBHE). The agencies are collaborating to align joint standard reports with the goals of the Illinois Public Agenda for College and Career Readiness. Black Hawk College, through its ***Underrepresented Groups Effective Practices Award process***, recognizes Black Hawk College programs which best exemplify the mission of College and that aim to support education attainment, access to higher education, addresses workforce needs and/or enhance economic growth of our district.

The College is proud to submit to the Illinois Community College Board two programs that have demonstrated effective practices in supporting students in underrepresented group (minorities, women, and handicapped individuals) in their educational attainment. Attached to this report are details regarding the effective practices of the Intentional Retention Initiative and Accelerating Opportunities (AO) Integrated Career and Academic Preparation System (I-CAPS)



Effective Practice One

Student Retention and College Credential Attainment

Title: Academic Analytic Tools & Environment to Support Decision Making & Student Success

Purpose, Goal, or Objective: To support a culture of data informed decision making the College has implemented a data warehouse completing several phases developing a culture of academic analytics. (Capture, report, predict, act, and refine.) The project focused on capturing data from multiple sources and in multiple formats; extracting data and migration to a data warehouse, and integrating those data to make them available for analysis.

Date of Implementation: Open availability of the Data Warehouse to Academic Deans and Financial Aid has currently been in the works since March 5, 2014, however the product's main launch was not until June 2014.

Description of Strategies: The Data Warehouse provides Student Advisors, academic leadership and staff of the office of Planning and Institutional Effectiveness with quick and easy access to all pertinent current and historical information about student being advised, including demographics, enrollment, registration, grades, and alerts and overall course activity.

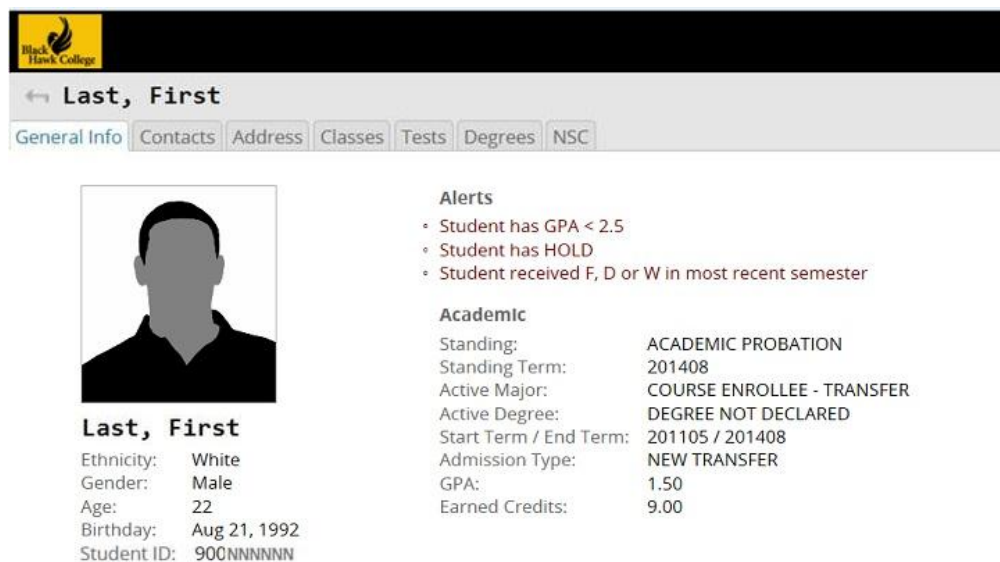
Throughout the process the college

- defined current culture and readiness,
- determined key College personnel with a vested interest in academic analytics,
- conducted a data audit to produce a strategy for capturing the data,
- determined ways in which to address risk and security issues,
- designed a plan to store and integrate data from multiple sources and ultimately prepare the college to move to the next stage of *reporting* thru the use of analysis tools that perform queries, examine information, and identify trends, patterns, and exceptions in the data.
- Conducted significant testing and data integrity audits
- Created data dictionaries
- Implemented and trained student services personnel on the use of the Student Advisor Navigator module

Personnel from Student Services, Planning and Institutional Effectiveness (PIE), and Information Technology (IT) participated in various project activities. Student Services and PIE staff participated in loading departmental data and the overall data verification process, and were consulted regarding the development of custom criteria and reports. ITS supported the installation and maintenance of the software and required access activities for users.

Evidence of Success: The Data Warehouse Student Navigator was made available for access by Student Services and Institutional Research. Student information tables were loaded from Ellucian and departmental sources and data integrity was verified. A test environment was created in order to review customizations prior to production installation. Student Advisors use the Student Navigator on a daily basis and report significant time savings and ease of access to more complete information over the previous methodology.

- Advisors are able to:
 - Advise comprehensively with access to multiple data sources on an easy user friendly screen
 - empowers the end user with easy to use ad-hoc query and reporting tools
 - easily identify and contact groups of students requiring changes to their academic plan
 - identify and easily communicate with key cohorts of students
 - customize reports and pull data as frequently as needed
 - proactively intervene with at-risk students

The data warehouse allows staff to accommodate individual differences in how services are provided by providing improved access to large amounts of data and information. The system automatically calculates at-risk factors and displays them on the advisors home screen. As the college IT systems become increasingly sophisticated the data warehouse provides a growing capacity to navigate among such information resources as the colleges ERP system, National Student Clearing House and other student tracking software used by individual departments.

Effective Practice Two

Title: BHC AO-I-CAPS Industry Field Experiences

Purpose, Goal, or Objective: The program provides industry-recognized credentials, which are integrated with basic skills for Adult Education students, through partnerships with Career and Technical Education.

Date of Implementation: July 1, 2013 – June 30, 2014

Description of Strategies: Black Hawk College participated in Illinois' Integrated Career and Academic Preparation System (ICAPS) program which is part of the national Accelerated Opportunity (AO) initiative. AO ICAPS programs provide industry-recognized credentials which are integrated with basic skills for Adult Education students through partnerships with Career and Technical Education. Black Hawk College Adult Education in partnership with the Career and Technical Education (Perkins) launched an AO pilot program in the career pathway area of Manufacturing: Computer Numerical Control (CNC). Program design includes the following: Classes are team taught with an Adult Education instructor and various content instructors. Intensive support services are provided by both Adult Education and Perkins department support staff during the duration of the course work. Students are also required to attend an Adult Education contextualized support class throughout the program year where they receive basic skills instruction, additional course support, tutoring, and connections with other College departments (i.e., financial aid, advising, Career Services) and connect with industry via classroom presentations and site visits to area employers. Students are selected based on standardized TABE test scores, career interest and a high commitment to the program requirements. It is intended that AO ICAPS students by-pass developmental education courses but also attend a preparation bridge-like math course prior to being placed into credit bearing courses. Two stackable certificates allow students to step out and back in to the program if needed and include: CNC Manufacturing Certificate 1 (15 credit hours and a pre-requisite for Certificate 2) and CNC Manufacturing Certificate 2 (14 credit hours) which makes up the full 29 credit hour certificate program. Coursework may also lead to the Engineering Technology A.A.S. degree.

The level of industry connections within this on-going AO I-CAPS project is a new and fortuitous venture for Black Hawk College and underrepresented groups. For example, we have made great strides in connecting AO and other CNC students with a local company. Company representatives have met with CNC and Adult Education faculty, staff and the Perkins staff to discuss curriculum and make arrangements for job shadowing and future company visits to

campus. Starting on January 30 2015, groups consisting of CNC AO I-CAPS and traditional CNC students will be rotating every two weeks between facility visits and the classroom for eight weeks. The company has also begun discussions to have additional hiring managers visit with BHC faculty in the CNC lab. The AO I-CAPS project is evolving and involves employers at a much higher level than ever before. This close connection will serve as a model for other College departments and employers.

Evidence of Success: The pilot year consisted of the first cohort of seven English As A Second Language (ESL) students completing a total of 14 credentials/certificates. All seven students participated in the BHC Commencement ceremony in May 2014 to receive their certificates.
