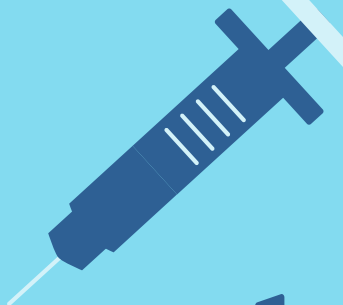
Complete these steps to join UIC's Dual Admissions Pathway:

1) Meet with your advisor or Director of Nursing at your community college and identify as a Dual Admissions Pathway student.

2) Visit go.uic.edu/DualAdmissions to receive a detailed transcript evaluation, connect with your UIC Dual Admissions Pathway advisor and submit a Pathways Authorization Form.

3) When prompted by your advising team, complete the one-time, UIC Dual Admissions Pathway application and submit official transcripts.

Then, follow your personalized roadmap to an Associate Degree in Nursing from your community college and a Bachelor of Science in Nursing from UIC.

1) Enroll in Associate Degree in Nursing Program.



2) Contact a UIC Advisor to identify courses which must be completed prior to admission.



3) Complete ADN and apply for admission to UIC.

- Cumulative transfer grade point average of 2.50/4.00 and no less than a "C" in all required coursework
