### **Electives**

Students should work with an advisor to select only articulated transfer or career courses as electives to satisfy the 64 credit hour graduation requirement. No course numbered below 100 will apply toward graduation.

Courses may also include:

- Courses that transfer from other institutions as UPP.
- Up to four credits of physical education activity courses will count toward graduation. The PE Varsity Sports Courses (numbers 101-122) will be evaluated as activity courses for the purpose of graduation.
- Up to twelve credits of applied music lessons (MUSC 121-147 & 221-247) will count toward graduation.
- Up to eight credits of music performance groups (MUSC 101-109) will count toward graduation.
