# (PR) STUDENT/MARKET NEED: (CTE) Describe the current and future occupational demand for the program. Include Advisory Committee feedback on demand for skills and an analysis of student enrollment trends and projections.

This degree is intended to prepare students for transfer to a baccalaureate program in social work and/ or paraprofessional employment in human services. The unique courses in this curriculum are SOC 222 Introduction to Social Work and a topics course that may include offerings such as addictions, child welfare, and field studies. The local demand according to the occupational report is expected to increase by 8%. The occupational report looked only BSW and MSW and not at paraprofessional employment. The number of students claiming a General Social Services concentration has ranged from 32 to 51 students. However, student enrollment in SOC 222 has ranged from 5 to 19 students in the past 5 years. Not all students actually enroll in the introduction to social work course. This may reflect the variation in baccalaureate social work program requirements. Because of the increasing need for Social Workers, Western Illinois University is contemplating bringing the BSW to the Quad City campus. If this occurs, enrollment in 2009, the course has been taught by a adjunct faculty member. Generally one section in the spring is offered each year alternating evening and daytime hours.

Because the course offerings in this concentration are low and enrollment is small the percentage of change in credit hour generation look large and unit cost analysis is variable. The number of students in this concentration has been stable ranging from 32 to 51. The number of students enrolled in SOC 222 has varied from the high of 19 to the low of 5. Currently an MSW prepared advisor for BHC is teaching the SOC 222. She has been doing a mailing to students who have indicated General Social Service on their application to encourage enrollment is SOC 222. Currently there are 9 students enrolled. If the baccalaureate social work program come to Western Illinois University Quad City campus we can anticipate program growth.

## **Industry Data**

In order to capture a complete picture of industry employment, EMSI basically combines covered employment data from Quarterly Census of Employment and Wages (QCEW) produced by the Department of Labor with total employment data in Regional Economic Information System (REIS) published by the Bureau of Economic Analysis (BEA), augmented with County Business Patterns (CBP) and Nonemployer Statistics (NES) published by the U.S. Census Bureau. ## Shift Share

Shift share is a standard regional analysis method that attempts to determine how much of regional job growth can be attributed to national trends and how much is due to unique regional factors.

Students taking Spanish learn to read, speak, write, and listen in the Spanish language. Conversations and texts cover a variety of everyday situations and different cultural aspects. Spanish study includes the use of a basic text, a workbook, a reader/laboratory manual, and computer assisted instruction. Speaking and listening skills are developed through practice in class and with Web based instructional materials.

Language training can give a student a mastery of Spanish and English grammar and will improve cultural understanding. The training will also help students meet a requirement of many bachelor's degree and advanced degree programs.

With over 400 million speakers worldwide, Spanish is one of the world's most widespread languages. In the United States alone, where the Hispanic population is the largest minority group, there are over thirty million Spanish speakers.

Because of the large Spanish-speaking population in the U.S. and our proximity to Mexico and other Hispanic American countries, the ability to speak Spanish is viewed as a very important skill by many employers. Understanding Spanish can open vast treasures of literature, history, music, art, philosophy, and other areas of a large and varied culture.

SOC 101 Principles of Sociology3 cr. hrs.Prerequisites: College level reading scores on COMPASSrequired, or REA 093 and SBS 100 "C" or better, or REA098 and SBS 100 "C" or better.

Scientific examination of human society and social behavior. Concentrates on human behavior and assumes that it is largely shaped by the groups to which people belong and by the social interaction taking place in these groups. Acquire a basic sociological understanding and sensitivity to the issues of race, class, gender, and ethnicity. 3 lecture hours; 0 lab hours per week. IAI: S7 900

**SOC 102 Contemporary Social Problems 3 cr. hrs.** Analysis of contemporary social problems and investigation of theories on social organization and conflict. Explores the genesis, significance, and amelioration of social problems. 3 lecture hours; 0 lab hours per week. IAI: S7 901

# **SOC 210 Contemporary Urban Institutions 3 cr. hrs.** *Prerequisite: SOC 101 or instructor consent.*

A survey of the structure and functions of urban communities. 3 lecture hours; 0 lab hours per week.

**SOC 222 Introduction to Social Work 3 cr. hrs.** *Prerequisite: SOC 101 or instructor consent.* 

Introductory survey of social work in the context of the social welfare services and policies, including their historical origins, conceptual framework, and contemporary foci. Overviews principal social work values, codes of ethics, practice methods, research considerations, and policy issues. Emphasizes the unique experiences of diverse and at-risk population groups facing various social challenges. 3 lecture hours; 0 lab hours per week.

### SOC 230 Sociology of Sex and Gender

Prerequisite: SOC 101 or instructor consent.

Provides a framework for understanding the sources and consequences of gender and sex role in the economy, family, education, and other social institutions. 3 lecture hours; 0 lab hours per week.

### SOC 250 Minority Relations 3 cr. hrs.

Examines racial, ethnic, and gender minorities. A comprehensive overview of major sociological theories regarding interaction between dominant and minority groups and an investigation of the experiences of

minorities in the United States. 3 lecture hours; 0 lab hours per week. IAI: S7 903D

#### **SOC 251 Marriage and the Family 3 cr. hrs.** Survey of the contemporary family in historical and crosscultural perspectives. Includes trends in mate selection

cultural perspectives. Includes trends in mate selection, marriage, child-rearing, employment, gender roles, and communication within the family. 3 lecture hours; 0 lab hours per week. IAI: S7 902

## SOC 255 Social Statistics 3 cr. hrs.

*Prerequisites: SOC 101 or PSYC 101; Math 091.* Application and interpretation of basic statistics used in the behavioral sciences including descriptive statistics and an introduction to inferential statistics. 3 lecture hours; 0 lab hours per week.

#### **SOC 261 Deviant Behavior 3 cr. hrs.** The sociological study of the origins causes control and

The sociological study of the origins, causes, control and definitions of deviance and deviant behavior. Includes criminality, mental disorders, drug use, and sexuality. 3 lecture hours; 0 lab hours per week.

## SOC 264 Social Psychology of Aging 3 cr. hrs.

Process and consequences of aging; interplay between social and psychological forces and the aging population; psychological dimensions of aging. 3 lecture hours; 0 lab hours per week. IAI: S6 905

### SOC 270 Sociology of Health

Prerequisite: SOC 101.

Health care systems and issues in cross-cultural context; dimensions of wellness and illness including mental health, health providers, organizations, and institutions and their relations. 3 lecture hours; 0 lab hours per week.

## SOC 290 Studies in Sociology 1-3 cr. hrs.

Focuses on selected topics from a sociological perspective, including such topics as child maltreatment, addictions, juvenile justice, family violence, death and dying, and field studies. 1-3 lecture hours; 0 lab hours per week.

3 cr. hrs.

Students who have not taken Spanish at BHC must take a brief placement test.

## SPAN 101 Elementary Spanish I 4 cr. hrs.

First course of a two semester sequence in elementary Spanish with emphasis on speaking, listening comprehension, reading, writing and culture. 4 lecture hours; 0 lab hours per week.

**SPAN 102 Elementary Spanish II 4 cr. hrs.** *Prerequisite: One year of high school Spanish "C" or better or one semester of college Spanish "C" or better or the equivalent.*



### **CS 100 Introduction to Computers**

Prerequisite: Appropriate placement score or REA 093 "B" or better.

Introduction to computer concepts, computer applications, and the impact of computers on society. Applications include word processing, spreadsheet, database, presentation and web-based software. Basic Algebra or equivalent is recommended.

3 credit hours: 3 lecture hours; 1 lab hour per week.

### **ECON 221 Principles of Macro Economics**

Study of the basic macro economic principles of a capitalistic economy, its strengths and weaknesses including supply and demand, prices, role of government, national income measurement and determination, money, banking, monetary and fiscal policies, inflation and unemployment, international trade and payments.

3 credit hours: 3 lecture hours; 0 lab hours per week. IAI: S3 901

#### ENG 101 Composition I

Prerequisite: An ACT English score of 22-36, the appropriate COMPASS score, or successful completion of English 091.

English 101 is designed for students who are competent in the fundamentals of composition. Students will write essays using a variety of expository strategies and will apply standard techniques of documentation when appropriate.

3 credit hours: 3 lecture hours; 0 lab hours per week. IAI: C1 900/C1 900R (Grade of "C" or higher required for this course to be eligible to be included in the IAI General Education Core Curriculum.)

#### ENG 102 Composition II

Prerequisite: English 101 "C" or better.

English 102 is a continuation of English 101, is a required composition course that involves reading, discussion, and analysis of a body of literature to generate ideas for critical and persuasive papers,

including one documented research paper.

3 credit hours: 3 lecture hours; 0 lab hours per week. IAI: C1 901R (Grade of "C" or higher required for this course to be eligible to be included in the IAI General Education Core Curriculum.)

#### MATH 108 Statistics for General Education

*Prerequisites: Appropriate placement score or MATH 086 or 090 or 091 "C" or better and MATH 085.* General education course in basic principles and procedures of statistics including levels of measurement, graphic presentation, descriptive measures of central tendency and dispersion, inferential statistics and hypothesis testing, analysis of variance and regression. Course includes use of appropriate technology and interpretation of statistical data reported in subject matter literature. 3 credit hours: 3 lecture hours; 0 lab hours per week. IAI: M1 902

#### PHIL 103 Ethics

Prerequisite: Appropriate COMPASS score or ENG 091 or REA 098 "C" or better. Presents an introduction to the moral problems of society with an emphasis on concepts and systems. 3 credit hours: 3 lecture hours; 0 lab hours per week. IAI: H4 904

#### **PSYC 101 Introduction to Psychology**

# Prerequisites: College level reading scores on COMPASS or REA 093 and SBS 100 "C" or better, or REA 098 and SBS 100 "C" or better.

A survey of the field of general psychology without specific emphasis on any particular theory or model of human or animal behavior. Fundamental principles, methods, theories and issues in the field are discussed. Content areas may include learning, thinking, neuroscience, methodology, memory, perception, personality, intelligence, emotion, adjustment, and abnormality among others. 3 credit hours: 3 lecture hours; 0 lab hours per week. IAI: S6 900

#### SOC 101 Principles of Sociology

# Prerequisites: College level reading scores on COMPASS required, or REA 093 and SBS 100 "C" or better, or REA 098 and SBS 100 "C" or better.

Scientific examination of human society and social behavior. Concentrates on human behavior and assumes that it is largely shaped by the groups to which people belong and by the social interaction taking place in these groups. Acquire a basic sociological understanding and sensitivity to the issues of race, class, gender, and ethnicity.

3 credit hours: 3 lecture hours; 0 lab hours per week. IAI: S7 900

#### SOC 222 Introduction to Social Work

#### Prerequisite: SOC 101 or instructor consent.

Overviews principal social work values, codes of ethics, practice methods, research considerations, and policy issues. #### SOC 250 Minority Relations

Examines racial, ethnic, and gender minorities. A comprehensive overview of major sociological theories regarding interaction between dominant and minority groups and an investigation of the experiences of minorities in the United States.

3 credit hours: 3 lecture hours; 0 lab hours per week. IAI: S7 903D

#### SOC 290 Studies in Sociology

Focuses on selected topics from a sociological perspective, including such topics as child maltreatment, addictions, juvenile justice, family violence, death and dying, and field studies. 1-3 credit hours: 1-3 lecture hours; 0 lab hours per week.

#### **SPEC 101 Principles of Speech Communication**

The oral communication course combines communication theory with the practice of oral communication skills. The oral communication course: (1) develops awareness of the communication process; (2) provides inventional, organizational, and expressive strategies; (3) promotes understanding of and adaptation to a variety of communication contexts; and (4) emphasizes critical skills in listening, reading, thinking and speaking.

3 credit hours: 3 lecture hours; 0 lab hours per week. IAI: C2 900

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
